



## PASTOR'S CORNER

It is likely that we have all heard someone asking, "What are you giving up for Lent?" I guess that idea of giving up something arises out of one of the traditional Lenten disciplines of fasting. If fasting has a way of bringing one closer to Christ, it is a most worthwhile thing to do. If giving something up has a way of bringing us closer to Christ, that is certainly worthwhile. I've known some who did a superficial kind of thing like giving up eating broccoli during Lent (they couldn't stand broccoli anyway). But whatever one does, the discipline that really means something is whatever draws us closer to Christ—and often that may not involve giving up something; instead it may involve adding something. Some have found meaning in adding a new habit of Bible Study, or reading some new devotional material, or setting a time aside for prayer during the day. Some have taken on a special charitable cause. The key is drawing closer to Christ where we see meaning in what God has given us through Christ's self-giving love. You may want to give up something—but, you may want to think of adding something during this Lenten season.



Our Christmas Giving Trees were a great success this year. Gifts were delivered to the Florence House for both homeless mothers and babies residing there. A lovely thank you letter from the staff, mothers and children expressed great appreciation. Twelve families were assisted and experienced Christ's love through Zion's outreach. Thirty gifts of lap blankets, sweaters and sweatshirts were delivered to the Sun Bridge Nursing Home. Twenty four gifts for teenagers were delivered to Worcester Project AIDS so that their families could "shop" for appropriate gifts for their loved ones. As always, the members of Zion are generous and glad to share their Christian love in our church, community, and the world. The assistance of Pam and David Olson in organizing this project and helping with deliveries is invaluable!

The items for the 120 Challenge were coffee and tea last month. Fifty four packages were contributed. The shortage can most likely be attributed to the unusually snowy weather. Thank you to Cindy Joslyn and Sue Butchman who deliver our contributions the first of each month.

February has already been a busy month for our committee. This month, The Confirmation Class conducted the annual Souper Bowl of Giving. Monetary contributions to the Oxford Food Pantry were asked for at the February 6, 2011, services. We appreciate the help of the young people. The second project was to make eighteen "baskets of love" for our elderly and shut-ins. Edible treats, packets of tissues, lip balm and word search books were included in the baskets, along with cards from the congregation and Sunday School students. Some of the baskets were taken on February 6 and the remainder will be delivered over the next week. The item of the month for The Zion 120 challenge is canned soup. For those who like to plan ahead, the item for March will be canned vegetables, excluding mixed vegetables.

## WHAT GOD CAN DO WITH 57 CENTS

A little girl stood near a small church from which she had been turned away because it was 'too crowded'. 'I can't go to Sunday School,' she sobbed to the pastor as he walked by. Seeing her shabby, unkempt appearance, the pastor guessed the reason and, taking her by the hand, took her inside and found a place for her in the Sunday school class. The child was so happy that they found room for her, and she went to bed that night thinking of the children who have no place to worship Jesus.

Some two years later, this child lay dead in one of the poor tenement buildings. Her parents called for the kindhearted pastor who had befriended their daughter to handle the final arrangements. As her poor little body was being moved, a worn and crumpled red purse was found which seemed to have been rummaged from some trash dump. Inside was found 57 cents and a note, scribbled in childish handwriting, which read: 'This is to help build the little church bigger so more children can go to Sunday School.' For two years she had saved for this offering of love.

When the pastor tearfully read that note, he knew instantly what he would do. Carrying this note and the cracked, red pocket-book to the pulpit, he told the story of her unselfish love and devotion. He challenged his deacons to get busy and raise enough money for the larger building.

But the story does not end there...

A newspaper learned of the story and published it. It was read by a wealthy realtor who offered them a parcel of land worth many thousands. When told that the church could not pay so much, he offered to sell it to the little church for 57 cents.

Church members made large donations. Checks came from far and wide. Within five years the little girl's gift had increased to \$250,000.00--a huge sum for that time (near the turn of the century). Her unselfish love had paid large dividends.

When you are in the city of Philadelphia, look up Temple Baptist Church, with a seating capacity of 3,300. And be sure to visit Temple University, where thousands of students are educated. Have a look, too, at the Good Samaritan Hospital and at a Sunday School building which houses hundreds of beautiful children, built so that no child in the area will ever need to be left outside during Sunday school time

In one of the rooms of this building may be seen the picture of the sweet face of the little girl whose 57 cents, so sacrificially saved, made such remarkable history. Alongside of it is a portrait of her kind pastor, Dr. Russell H. Conwell, author of the book, 'Acres of Diamonds'.

This is a true story, which goes to show **WHAT GOD CAN DO WITH 57 CENTS.**

### Stories about Stephen Ministry in Action

#### Walking in Someone Else's Shoes

One cold December evening, the pastor was leading the Stephen Leaders and Stephen Ministers in the closing prayer of their supervision session. All heads were bowed when suddenly they heard the door open. Everyone looked up to see who was there. The pastor asked, "May I help you?"

A street woman hobbled in wearing tattered and torn clothes and shoes with so many holes that they were falling apart. The woman first apologized for interrupting and then said, "I was trying to see if I could find a church that could give me a pair of shoes. I went to another church in town and they couldn't help me, so I walked over here." A Stephen Minister near the door immediately asked, "What size do you wear?" "Eight and a half," the woman answered.

The Stephen Minister bent down to take off one of her new walking shoes. "That's my size," she said. "Why don't you sit down over here and try this on to see if it fits you." As the woman slipped it on, she said, "Oh, that feels wonderful. Nice and warm."

The Stephen Minister took off her other shoe and gave it to the woman. "Here's the other one, too." The woman looked up, surprised. "I can't take these. I don't want to take your shoes." But the Stephen Minister insisted, saying, "Please. Go ahead and take these. I've got another pair at home."

The ragged woman accepted the gift, put on the other shoe and moved toward the door. Her hand on the doorknob, she turned back to them and said, "Thank you so much. God bless you. God bless you all."

The entire incident took only a minute or so, but it left everyone in the room standing in stunned silence. A Stephen Leader broke the silence by turning to the Stephen Minister and saying, "That was so beautiful. But how are you going to get home? It's cold and wet outside, and you don't have any shoes now." The Stephen Minister replied, "I've got a thick pair of socks--and I do have a pair of shoes." And she proceeded to put the homeless woman's tattered shoes onto her own feet.

What happened was both a prayer and an answer to prayer that brought to a close that particular supervision session with a powerful sense of God's presence. One by one the Stephen Ministers left, quietly and reflectively. Finally only the Stephen Leader and the Stephen Minister with the tattered shoes remained. As the Stephen Minister moved toward the door, the Stephen Leader noticed her hobbling a bit because the old shoes were worn, uneven, and uncomfortable. "Please be careful," the Stephen Leader said. "I don't want you to fall and get hurt." "I'll walk slowly," the Stephen Minister replied with a smile. "Now I really know what it's like to walk in someone else's shoes!"




