FAITH – LET'S PRACTICE!

As Lutherans, we believe that our salvation is through **faith alone** – through a confident trust in God, who in Christ promises us forgiveness, life and salvation. This faith comes to us not because of something we do, but as a gift from God. Faith is not a static thing, like a book on a shelf; it is active vibrant and a central part of our lives.

A few years ago, a book was published called *Practicing Our Faith*. This book contains a collection of essays about Christian Practices –the ways we live our lives as faithful Christians in the midst of increasingly busy lives. The practices highlighted in the book are Keeping Sabbath, Hospitality, Testimony, Household Economics, Honoring Our Bodies, Forgiveness, Singing as a Spiritual Practice, Healing, Learning, and Dying Well... As a way of exploring this idea, I plan to offer a series of reflections in the newsletter – brief thoughts each month on how we live faithful lives through one of these Faith practices. I hope these might encourage conversation in your homes about these topics. If you want to explore any of them more deeply as a community, we could form a study/discussion group around one or more of these topics.

This month, we begin with the Keeping Sabbath. In the first two chapters of Genesis, we read the creation story... and on the seventh day, after God completed the work of creation, God rested and blessed the seventh day, making it a Holy Day. This seventh day, the Sabbath day, is traditionally a day set apart for worship. We gather together as Christians to sing and pray and hear the Word, to be nourished spiritually, fed by Holy Communion and sent out to do God's work in the world.

Keeping Sabbath is more than just worship on Sunday morning. Years ago, stores were not open on Sundays and our communal life was lived at a slower pace. Nowadays, we have to discipline ourselves if we want to live a slower-paced day on Sunday. That is not always possible – especially for folks who have to work in health services or retail jobs or are students. So... how do you keep the Sabbath? How is your practice different from when you were a child? If you have to work on a Sunday, do you make time for another day of rest in your week?

In the following poem, Wendell Barry, a contemporary farmer-poet reminds us that like God's Sabbath, our rest comes after work well done.

*Whatever is foreseen in joy
Must be lived out from day to day.
Vision held open in the dark
By our ten thousand days of work.
Harvest will fill the barn; for that
The hand must ache, the face must sweat.*

*And yet no leaf or grain is filled
By work of ours; the field is tilled
And left to grace. That we may reap,
Great work is done while we're asleep.*

*When we work well, a Sabbath mood
Rests on our day, and finds it good.*
(1979, no. X by Wendell Berry (The Sabbath Poems))

FALL STEWARDSHIP RESPONSE

On Tuesday, September 25th, we began our annual stewardship response time with Dinner Church. We had a great turnout for worship, dinner, and a reflection by Pastor Nancy on a reading from Jesus' Sermon on the Mount. *Therefore I tell you, do not worry about your life...But strive first for the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well.* (Matthew 6:25-33). In the next three weeks, we will hear brief reflections on stewardship and giving from Paul Peterson, Ken Bean and Bob Laurens during the Sunday and Tuesday worship services. On Sunday, October 14th, we will bring our completed 2013 commitment cards to worship.

I went to Bishop Payne's Retirement Party in September. One of the things I remember best about her is her passion for stewardship. Bishop Margaret came and spoke at Zion's Commitment Sunday several years ago and her sermon centered on tithing. I have gone to two Stewardship Conferences with in the synod and her topic was about stewardship and tithing. Because of her sermons, I have gradually increased my own giving to tithe. It is amazing how that commitment really does open up space in your life to receive far more than you give.

As quoted from Mark Victor Hansen in "*The Miracle of Tithing*":

Tithing is the best kept prosperity secret in existence. It's an old secret that works yet has been virtually forgotten.

After going bankrupt, and finding [himself] mentally, spiritually and emotionally depressed ... [Mark] discovered tithing. [He] started by giving a little and kept increasing it as [his] returns increased in virtually automatic, invisible and often unexpected ways. Miracles never cease to amaze [him]. [He] expects them, but their consistent arrival is always delightful to experience.

Giving makes you more productive. Even the little lad who gave his lunch of five loaves and two fishes had Jesus multiply his gift to feed 5,000 hungry people and gave back to the lad "twelve baskets full." Please note that giving serves the giver, many others, and is returned multiplied.

In summation, tithing works for those who work with tithing. If you have never tried it, give it a 3-month trial. Remember, when you give, like attracts like. If need be, start with one-percent of your income, time, energy or effort and build up to ten-percent. A great philosopher once said, "Whatever you want more of, give some of it away."

God has entrusted us as stewards of his world to caring for all God has generously allowed us to use. God trusts us to use these gifts in ways that celebrate Him and spread his word to into the world around us. Stewardship is about all of life – giving ourselves to God and using all God has given us. Understanding stewardship as a spiritual discipline allows us to decide what sort of person we want to be. It is often easier to *act* ourselves into a new way of thinking than to *think* ourselves into a new way of acting.

May God's peace be with you always as we look for opportunities to serve God and our church,



LSS PROGRAM IN WORCESTER SEEKS PROFESSIONALS FOR HUMAN RIGHTS COMMITTEE

The Forsberg Transitional Living and North Ashland Street programs in Worcester, Mass., are seeking volunteers to form a Human Rights committee

Under the regulations of the Mass. Department of Developmental Services, LSS is required to create such a committee to safeguard the rights of the people we serve: the Forsberg program supports 60 adults with developmental disabilities who live independently. The North Ashland program serves five adult men who require 24 hour support

This committee, which will meet monthly except for July and August, will be composed of the following credentialed volunteers: an attorney or paralegal, a nurse (RN) or a physician (MD), a master's level clinician or psychiatrist, a community member and a family member

Their responsibilities include reviewing all incident reports, behavior plans and training materials. Meetings may be attended via conference call as long as an attendance sheet is signed.
